There are still things that need to be done but the projects are getting smaller. If you would like to help out, just let me know. Of course there is always weeding to be done.



September 12th. Our plan is not only to celebrate coming back into the sanctuary, but also take time to remember and grieve who and what have been



To place an "end parenthesis" to our flood journey, the reading from the Old Testament will also be from Genesis. The other readings will be those assigned by the lectionary.

For the rest of the "Season after Pentecost" we will continue using the liturgy we have used

through the summer, through Christ the King with added musical elements, including the psalm, anthems and additional hymns. Most of the sung music will occur toward the middle and end of our services in order to minimize the amount of breath released into the sanctuary, and the time spent with that breath. The choir will be in a large semi circle, masked and distanced. We'll find new air at the end of the service and promptly leave the sanctuary for the Parish Hall and/or outdoors for coffee and fellowship.








Beginning in September, we welcome **Becki Casey** as our new seminarian.

PLANNED GIVING TO SUSTAIN REDEEMER'S FUTURE

This is a series of articles addressing stewardship as it relates to the future of our parish. Please be sure to consult with your financial advisor and/or your attorney when you make plans for any giving.



BEQUESTS AND WILLS

One of the simplest and most common ways to make a planned gift is by naming Redeemer in your will, using the church's full, legal name, "Episcopal Church of the Redeemer"

A bequest is a meaningful way to support our work without affecting cash flow during your lifetime.

There are several *types* of bequests that you can make:

- * A *specific bequest* indicates the *amount* of cash, securities or other asset you wish to leave to Redeemer. Or it can indicate a specific *percentage* of the total value of your estate.
- * A *residuary bequest* leaves the remaining portion of your estate (or a percentage of the total) after all other bequests have been satisfied.
- * You can make Redeemer the recipient of a *contingency bequest*, which considers the possibility of a change in your beneficiary's circumstances.



SPECIFIC: a bequest for a specific dollar amount or specific percentage of your estate:

I give, devise and bequeath to Episcopal Church of the Redeemer the sum of \$_____ as an unrestricted gift, to be used at the sole discretion of Episcopal Church of the Redeemer.

Or, you can make a bequest for specific assets, such as securities, real estate or personal property. Please be as specific as possible in identifying the property:

I give, devise and bequeath to Episcopal Church of the Redeemer my [insert description of the asset], to be used and/or disposed of, as the Episcopal Church of the Redeemer determines for its general purposes.

Redeemer has benefitted greatly by bequests over the last five years. If you do make a bequest in your will, please let the rector know you have done so. And, thank you. **RESIDUARY**: a residuary bequest gives all or a portion of the residue of your estate after payment of expenses and any amounts designated to other beneficiaries:

I give, devise, and bequeath to Episcopal Church of the Redeemer X percent of the rest, residue and remainder of my estate as an unrestricted gift, to be used at its sole discretion.

CONTINGENCY: a contingency bequest allows you to account for a change in your beneficiary's circumstances:

I give, devise, and bequeath [insert name] X percent of the rest, residue, and remainder of my estate if s/he survives me. If [insert name] does not survive me, I give, devise and bequeath to Episcopal Church of the Redeemer, X percent of the rest, residue, and remainder of my estate as an unrestricted gift, to be used at its sole discretion.

!URGENT! Remote Volunteer Position

Location: REMOTE

Samaritan Ministry is looking for a volunteer to track COVID-19 statistics across the DMV, to inform program decision-making by the organization.

Responsibilities include:

- Updating at least weekly an Excel workbook with the most recent data from COVID-19-related web sites, including those maintained by District, Maryland, and Northern Virginia authorities; the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and The New York Times.
- Preparing and sending a weekly email to the responsible team at SMGW with the workbook, key takeaways based upon the data, and a brief summary (i.e., quotes) from 2-3 top news stories, with links.
- Participating, if possible, in weekly team meetings where results are discussed along with their impact on SMGW operations.

Skills required:

- Good web research skills Able to identify reliable sources of information, copy and paste links, etc.
- Basic to good Excel skills able to do accurate, consistent data entry in an Excel workbook; adjust and update existing charts, including editing legends, axes, etc.
- Analytical skills accustomed to dealing with data; familiarity with data relating to health statistics or similar is a plus.
- Good writing skills able to synthesize and summarize key points of information and communicate them clearly.

Time requirements:

Once familiar with the work, this will likely require 3-4 hours per week (occasionally slightly more), including participation in the team meeting.

REDEEMER BOOK GROUP


We met in August on Zoom to discuss For Whom the Bell Tolls by Ernest Hemingway and had a very lively discussion.

Because of the happenings over the past 18 months on slavery, Black Lives Matter and the recent assassination of the president in Haiti, the Group decided to read *The Black Jacobins* by C.L.R. James. The book was published in 1938 by James, a Trinidadian historian on the history of the Haitian Revolution of 1791-1804. James places the Haitian Revolution in the recent assassination of the president in Haiti, context of the French Revolution. He focusses on the leadership of Toussaint L'Ouverture, who was born a slave but rose to prominence espousing the French Revolution ideals of liberty and equality, which were embraced by the persecuted blacks of Haiti.

AFGHAN FAMILY RESETTLEMENT

As of the writing of this article you have donated over \$7500 to the effort to help welcome, settle and provide for the needs of Afghan refugees arriving in our area. I would like to take just a little bit of time to tell you what I am doing in cooperation with Rev. Terri Murphy, deacon at Ascension Silver Spring and Rev. Sara Thorne, deacon at Christ Church Kensington. We are answering the call of Bishop Mariann Budde to take on this call of mercy, hospitality and bridge building. Terri and I met with the family of 7, who now have an apartment in Alexandria with the assistance of members of the local Afghan community. We provided them with the beginnings of putting a household together and acclimating to their new home. We concentrated first on food and the means to prepare it and the basics of setting up their new home. They are grateful and very humble in articulating their needs. We are in the process of obtaining mattresses and pillows for the 5 children and the parents. We provided bedding, towels and provided help for obtaining clothing and toiletries. We are working with them to assess their other needs for home furnishings and want to maximize their involvement in choosing what they feel they need and want and be respectful in recognizing that needs differ culturally.

We know that there is a need for a couple of laptop computers for use by the children for school. Area social service agencies will help enroll the children in school and at that time we may be asked to provide for school needs. This family is part of an extended family that has made it out of Afghanistan and hope to reunite close to one another here in the Metro Area. These other families (one of 4 and two of 3 members) will be arriving in the next couple of months from resettlement camps to which they have been taken for initial screening, medical care and emergency assistance. There is a large Afghan community in the Northern Virginia area, which is why Alexandria was chosen for their initial home. This provides for many things such as fellowship with others of similar cultural experiences, the promise of friendship and help in acclimating to a new cultural environment, and the spiritual support of other Afghan Muslim congregations. We see our role as helping them to become acclimated and begin making those connections that will enable them to thrive in their new home. Our role as a Christian community is one of friendship and support in providing initial basic resources until they are integrated into the care of the broader Afghan community and the assistance of social service agencies to connect them to governmental and community sources of ongoing support. Thank you for your initial generous outpouring of love for this family and for the rest of their family to come. This is being "doers of the Word and not hearers only" and is what Jesus asks of us. We deacons pledge to be good stewards of your love and generosity.

OPERATING RESULTS through July 31, 2021 are set forth in the adjoining profit and loss statement. Pledge income was \$20,923 below budget in July and is \$33,745 below budget year to date. Net operating income YTD is \$33,880 below budget. Close attention will need to be paid to pledge fulfillment during the remainder of the year.

Flood recovery expenditures and related building improvement projects, such as kitchen upgrade and new elevator, are not reflected in

the attached profit and loss statement, but are tracked separately. Flood recovery costs are largely covered by insurance, while building upgrade projects have been funded from the building reserve, special donations, and the operating account.

Redeemer has been through extraordinary trials over the last year and a half. I know, I know—just call me Captain Obvious. It's been about three years since I've been a parishioner at Redeemer and I look forward to returning in September, even if just for a few months. I wanted to write you—those whom I know and those to whom I'm a stranger—to tell you what I miss about Redeemer.

I miss being around those of you who, in my experience, don't shy away from the truth. I remember how much I enjoyed playing in the Taizé ensemble. Usually I played my recorder: occasionally I played piano. I'm not very skilled on either one. After one service at which I played particularly badly, I was bemoaning it to a fellow parishioner—one whom I didn't know very well. She smiled and said matter-offactly, "We don't go to hear you play. We go to worship." That not only checked whatever ego of mine was at play, it also gave me great relief. While we would have all preferred Geoffrey's playing to mine, it was about the worship, not any sort of performance. Thank you, Redeemer.

I miss the outreach—especially the concerts, labyrinth services and the strawberry festival. I'm very aware of The Great Commission. I planned on being a missionary at one time, but decided I was too sinful, and it would be hypocritical of me to go out and tell people about Jesus when I wasn't very Christlike. I'm better at quietly setting an example, as best I'm able. I love how Redeemer invites the public into the sacred space without an overt revival going on. We find common ground and offer a comfortable place for people to return, where we are happy to minister spiritually or otherwise. An example is a woman who stopped by the church once when I was the only one there. She asked for Cricket, then told me expectantly that she needed gas money to get home. She knew she could get what she needed at Redeemer. Thank you, Redeemer.

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
