WHAT'S AT REDEEMER TODAY

Ministry in the Time of COVID-19 Southern Montgomery County Deanery

Below is a list of ministries that individuals and families can complete from home during this time of physical isolation.

Knit a baby blanket, sweater, booties, or caps for Palestinian newborns at St. Luke's **Hospital in Nablus, Palestine**. Items should be held at home until physical distancing restrictions are lifted.

"Nickel Plated": Parishioners can set aside 5 cents for every meal that is eaten in your home over the next month. Then write a check for that amount, making it out to their parish and sending it to the church office. Money collected will be sent to Bethesda Cares. Please write "Nickel Plated" on the subject line. Collect non-perishable goods to donate to Manna Food Center (list of most-needed foods). Bring food to the church and leave it in the plastic tubs at the door near the labyrinth. Please sanitize and wear gloves when you deliver.

Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington desperately needs travel-sized, empty vials to fill with hand-sanitizer for volunteers to hand out. Order from Amazon and have delivered to SMGW's Northwest Office (1516 Hamilton Street NW, Washington, DC 20011).

FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Dear Redeemer Family,

I hope you are all safe and well. Please take care of yourself and those close to you. There have been so many changes in such a short period of time. We have gone from bustling DC metropolitan spring to what feels slower than slowest DC traffic day in August. Unthinkably, our churches and the National Cathedral closed and our spiritual communities are turning to the internet. The Smithsonian, the schools, the streets are empty, and but the clinical and the hospitals will be full.

Things will not be normal soon. We will not be physically together for Holy Week, Easter, or the Easter season. Many school graduation ceremonies are cancelled, weddings postponed. And, while it pains me to say this, it is hard to imagine that the Strawberry Festival can go forward this year.



How do we get through this? With God and with each other. Here are some thoughts about how we are doing to bring each other through this crisis.

- 1. Please try to stay connected in Worship. I am sure many of you feel as I do, missing the holiness of Sunday service, the beauty of the music, the fellowship at coffee hour...but the Church is still with us and our community is still here. Cricket, Geoffrey, and Bob are working very hard to provide the tech support for us to share Sunday service as well as services during the week. I feel fortunate that I could share in Sunday ("The Five"), Morning Prayer, Compline, even a vestry meeting, all through virtual means. If you haven't done this because you just unsure of how to connect on your phone or computer, please call the office or send an email to me at mbcaulfield@verizon.net. We want you with us!
- 2. Please stay connected in Community. Phone calls, email, Facebook...check in with your Redeemer friends. If you are having problems with connecting to the Redeemer Prayer Groups, email Cricket. While self-isolating physically, do not isolate socially. For me, one unexpected side effect of this chaos is that I have been in touch with some old friends with who I had fallen out of contact.
- 3. Please reach out if you need something. While many of you really should not be leaving your

homes at all, some of us who are at lower risk can (carefully) still go to grocery stores or pharmacies. Please email me at <u>mbcaulfield@verizon.net</u> if you need something and are not comfortable leaving your house. Redeemer folks will be there for you!

4. Please keep Cricket, Geoffrey, Bob, and Margaret in your hearts and prayers.

MUSIC AT REDEEMER



I wrote last month about finding God in the silences in the psalms, particularly as an antidote to DC traffic, little did I know...

The most challenging thing about this current situation for me, is how when you have an idea that might work in one set of circumstances, by the time you've started fashioning it, the world changes again. Hopefully we can all get used to this period of enforced stillness, and work out what it is to be a community of faith that cannot meet, greet and commune with one another.

I miss my choir, and I think they miss me! It doesn't matter how good on-line video and postproduction editing are, a community of people wanting to sing cannot be replaced by anything virtual, no matter how well intended or how well executed. In virtualism we can find a panacea, but it remains virtual, and only something to carry us to the next rehearsal or performance. (What a sing we will have when it is finally safe again to do so!!) In the ether, we can listen to previous services, watch previous concerts. In our homes we can work on our technique, and, hopefully submit solos or intrahousehold duets to incorporate into our streamed worship.

Geoffrey-the-Elder (Platt), the Music Committee and I had been putting the final touches to a wonderful 2020-21 season that we'd planned to launch at the Mozart Requiem. With so much up in the air, all of that is now on ice. I want to thank G-t-E for his support and encouragement, along with Cricket, Bob, David and Margaret. It had been a good season with Jo, Catherine and Cat fixing the library, Cynthia helping coordinate, David playing guitar-we had some good momentum going. But...we have been given the silences to work on different things.

Something I do want to thank God for is how lucky we are to have built enough through the generosity of FOMAR donations and ticket sales (including the new season pass and flexipass) to fund a next season, whatever that may look like. But wider than booking the season, I do feel the mission of Music at Redeemer may have to rapidly move to a wartime response footing.

Seeing how my friends and colleagues at the Met Opera, the NSO, and in many other institutions around the country and region are faring in these uncertain times, the sudden withdrawal of contracts without notice is devastating. For our artist friends and neighbors, the summer is a time when many make a third of their annual income at festivals and performances. This is an existential shock for them. We are not like Germany which created a flotilla of lifeboats for its arts community. And although the loss will be immediately devastating for artists, the fallout will impact us too, it will just take longer to experience.

What will our local arts scene look (and sound) like after all this is over? Dozens will be forced to move away or walk away from painstakingly built vocations to the certainty of driving for home delivery. It may take a decade to recover the richness of our inheritance and the diversity of our arts ecosystem; and frankly, with the fragility of that existence highlighted so keenly at just the outset of this outbreak, it might never do so.

At the last Thursday rehearsal I had with our Choir, I talked about how Purcell had practically reinvented a musical tradition that had been lost during the Commonwealth iconography of Oliver Cromwell. After the regicide of Charles I, the centuries-old practice of choirs, (growing up as a treble, graduating to adult singer, organist and composer)-that fabric of mentoring and apprenticeship was gone as true as bleach to a pond. Purcell had to reinvent, rebuild, and his music beautified our last choral worship.

In our little corner of the Washington community, my hope is that we will soon be able to throw a modest lifeline into the artistic pond, even as wealthy institutions seek to divest themselves of 'liabilities' and rely on re-runs...so that when it comes time to reopen our doors, to break the silence and to sing our hearts out, we will not be starting from scratch.

Even as we work to strengthen our on-line community, may our God-given talents soon come together again to lift individuals, strengthen our communities, and support the work of others in an un-virtual world. AMEN.

Bishop Mariann extends suspension of public worship until May 16

Dear Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington,

I give thanks to God for each of you and for your courage and creativity as we all adjust to the constraints required of us. Your entire diocesan staff is praying for you, that you may feel Christ's abiding presence as you tend to your loved ones and all within your sphere of pastoral concern. We are here to support you in any way we can.

In keeping with the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's most recent recommendation to cancel or postpone all gatherings of 50 or people for the next 8 weeks and in consultation with the Presiding Bishop, I am instructing all public services and other church gatherings be suspended until May 16th.

Rest assured that if these recommendations are lifted--and we all pray that this crisis passes sooner--I will re-open our churches gladly. For now, I want us all to have sufficient clarity to prepare for what lies ahead, most notably, Holy Week and Easter Sunday without physically gathering in church.

The spiritual, pastoral and financial implications of this pandemic are beyond what any of us can fully grasp or predict. But you belong to a diocesan community and we are in this together.

The storm we are in will one day pass and getting through it is our primary task. How we pray now, how we lead now, how we support one another and our people now, how we serve our community in Christ's name now will inform our future ministries far longer than the storm itself.

Remember that Jesus is in the boat with us.

FROM RUSSIA WITH LOVE

Hello, Redeemer! I thought some of you might be curious to know what's going on over here in Russia. February 22, I flew to Phoenix from Vladivostok (through Seoul and Seattle) to visit my parents. I was to fly back the same route



on March 9, but, due to the Coronavirus, Russia was not accepting planes from the Asian countries, so I had to be rerouted through New York, Paris and Moscow with two five-hour layovers. Gads, what a trip. When I got back, I was immediately put into a short 48-hour quarantine, just to be on the safe side. (I was, and remain, fine.) Soon after that, we were told that we were being evacuated to Moscow where the health care was better and there were more flight options, just in case.

I had to notify the sisters at the church, the director of the professional choir and a few friends that I would be leaving. The hard part was not knowing (and still not knowing) how long I'll be gone. I took care of the home front (packing, trying to creatively use up food on hand, securing important things) while Douglas worked long 12-plus-hour days at the Consulate to suspend operations in Vladivostok.

It's funny. As soon as I learned that I'd be without my piano for who knows how long, I kind of panicked. *How will I ever learn that Chopin Nocturne?* So I took packing breaks to practice. I asked for, and received, Scrivener (a word processing program for writers) for Christmas. It had received all of ten minutes of my time until I realized that I might not be able to bring my computer with me. So, I sat down and started the tutorial in some sort of weird desperation. I did get to bring my computer with me - we were allowed a separate shipment of 400 pounds of stuff to make life easier. (For me that included my pillows, down comforter, favorite spices and snacks, weights and push -up bars, exercise mats, music - there's a decent piano in the Embassy, my pool cue – there's a pool table in the pub in the Embassy, and a few books.) While studying music composition, I was taught and have often written about how, in our greatest limitations, we find our greatest freedoms. This is exactly the time during which wisdom like that prevails. In the absence of Russian classes, rehearsals, church services and meeting with friends, I have my writing and my music. I am mentally free to work on these cherished things. We arrived in Moscow Sunday the 22nd of March. We were greeted at the airport by our social sponsor who took us grocery shopping. We are living in an apartment on the Embassy compound. Within walking distance is the zoo, the Moscow River and several grocery stores. Daily, we must respond to a government (ours) Safe Alert to let security know we're alright. Every once in a while, we hear that the Marines are doing some drills and we can ignore any alarms. This announcement comes into our home through a loud speaker, a bit Orwellian.

I'm in good company. I'm surrounded with smart people who work well together. They set a good example which I hope rubs off onto me.

I've written a short version of my recent blog post. If you want to read the long version, go to rosestales.blogspot.com. (As I write this, my blog posting is tardy. If you don't see it, just check back later!) I love and miss you all.


This has been SOME Lent.

March 25

Dear friends in Christ,

Today the church celebrates the feast of the Annunciation of Our Lord Jesus Christ to the Blessed Virgin Mary. We recall Gabriel's announcement and Mary's acceptance, that God-among-us would be born to dwell with us. As I looked at the Gospel lesson to prepare writing this email, I had a bit of a jarring disconnect. "In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth..." I'm so used to hearing those words in happy time, at Christmastide or just before.

Hearing joyous words at this moment seemed incongruous, almost inappropriate. And then I realized my foolishness. 2,000 years ago, when the Angel Gabriel appeared to Mary, and she courageously accepted the news, the world was not a piece of cake. Mary's life was about to be upended. Her travail far exceeds my feeble struggles in every way.

This is precisely the shock and the scandal of the Incarnation. Into our fallen, sometimes awful, world, God comes among us. The word incarnation means something like enfleshment. God Almighty, who created the heavens and earth and who can do all things, willingly came to live among us, accepting the limitations of our frail flesh. Our God is not remote and uncaring. Our Creator loves us so much that God is willing to live in solidarity among us.

This present time in which many of us are living in enforced separation might seem to prevent connection and intimacy. In some ways, that is true. But it is also true that we are never distant from God. And thanks to telephones, computers, and other devices, we can stay connected to other people across great distance. So we have one another, and we always have God.

Are you lonely? Reach out to another person. Cast your cares on God in prayer. Know that your pain is real, and it is shared by God. And other people will share it with you too.

Do you know someone who might be yearning for connection? Reach out to them. Send an email. Make a call. Invite them into prayer. You might like to start by praying the collect appointed for today:

Pour your grace into our hearts, O Lord, that we who have known the incarnation of your Son Jesus Christ, announced by an angel to the Virgin Mary, may by his cross and passion be brought to the glory of his resurrection; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

I can't imagine Mary woke up that morning 2,000 years ago with any inkling of what was in store for her. In an astounding act of courage, she accepted her vocation with grace and dignity.

None of us could have imagined the challenges today will bring. I hope we can allow God's grace to pour into our hearts, and through us, into the world.

Deanery Wardens & Clergy Meet Virtually for Justice Dialogue

The wardens, along with the clergy, of the South Montgomery County Deanery met to discuss outreach possibilities on March 25th. All the parish communities (Redeemer, St. Dunstan's, St. John's Norwood, All Saints Chevy Chase, and Ascension and Grace Silver Spring) have active ministries to the homeless and hungry. Most were concerned about the immediate future. How can we minister to people when our churches are shut down? How do we address the need people feel to help somehow?

Deacon Terry Murphy, from Ascension, described one of their ministries called "Mustard Seed". It is a list of simple activities that people can do from home that can impact the lives of folks in need. She will be circulating this list, with the help of Rev'd Patty Alexander, rector of St. Dunstan's. Each church can then distribute it to their people with instructions for delivery of goods and/or services.

Deacon Anne Derse (St. John's) and Deacon Terry are both involved with the Interfaith Community Advisory Council, which is an advocacy arm through which the deanery can focus on other issues as they arise. They will keep the deanery advised as to what might be necessary as we move through the year.

Generally, the belief is that our work together at this time should include hands-on relief efforts, systemic change, and resourcing for people who are impacted by the COVID-19 outbreak. The wardens plan to meet again on April 8th.

MEDITATION

I wrote this Theological Reflection for my Education for Ministry in Exile class:

Focus: A Frame of Reference

Identify: A frame of reference is how we know where are. In geometry, it is the X and Y axes, by which we can define the location of a point or describe a line. More generally, we can understand a present circumstance by noticing how it is rather like something else that has happened, about which we know the outcome. In the COVID-19 crisis, I don't see a frame of reference. It's not like the flu, or car accidents, or even like the 1918 flu pandemic.

Explore:

What is this world like? Uncertain, like inhabiting a point on a plane without knowing where the edges of the plane are, or how close to an edge our point lies. What can I do, other than hunker down?

Where is growth possible? In developing patience. In the self-discipline to accomplish something every day. In prayer.

What can go wrong in this world? We grow impatient for resuming life as it was, and make the problem much worse.

What can be celebrated? That we can stay connected through technology. That, so far, those I love are safe. That so many who fill critical roles, from care givers to grocery clerks, are willing to risk themselves.

Connections to faith tradition:

Jesus used similes and parables to give his listeners a frame of reference to help them understand things that are largely incomprehensible, like the nature of the kingdom of God.

When Jesus was killed, his followers had no frame of reference in which to understand what had happened. When he appeared to them, alive, this must have further disoriented them. No axis, no compass, no simile could help them understand what had happened that Easter, and in the days that followed. Even the story of Jonah was an imperfect simile.

Pentecost was a breath-taking intervention to give the disciples understanding, and a new frame of reference, by showing them their location in relation to God, through God's Holy Spirit.



I believe, I will:

I believe that God gives us a frame of reference, even when the world does not. I will keep reaching out to God to know where I and my little point are located on this uncharted plane.

The onset of the oronavirus epidemic at the eginning of March has ramatically changed the financial utlook for the year. While Redeemer has sufficient resources o meet cash flow needs, I nticipate that this situation will ut Redeemer into a substantial eficit for the fiscal year. Because he physical church must be closed, edeemer will lose budgeted uilding use income and also will ot receive loose plate offerings, while normal expenses continue. I ecognize that these are difficult mes and that money may be horter than expected due to loss of ncome and/or declines in stock alues. However, I hope that those who can will continue to make upporting Redeemer a priority and hat those who normally fulfill eledge commitments via the plate vill use alternate ways to make heir gifts.

Bob, and Margaret-continue to be
fully engaged in the mission of the church.

My heart goes out to all who are suffering as a result of the impact of the coronavirus crisis ~ financially, through illness, or from isolation from the communities with which they normally engage.
