

I’m excited to do Easter outside, however, we won’t be doing any further outside services until May. (If that soon.) I’m taking some time away so that the renovations on the Rectory bathrooms can be completed. (Yes, yet another wrinkle in the whole pandemic drama.)

Take heart and rejoice. We will come out of this craziness before too much longer.




### An Invitation to Study the Women in Scripture with Deacon Adrienne

### The Bishop is Coming! The Bishop is Coming!

Currently Bishop Budde is scheduled to join us on Sunday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. This would have been our celebratory post-Strawberry Festival time together. Instead, we will be hosting our bishop. How are we going to prepare for her visit?

APRIL 17<sup>TH</sup> – REDEEMER COMMUNITY WORK DAY: Did you remember that the flood occurred on April 17, 2020? How appropriate that we should schedule a work day on the first anniversary of that occurrence. A Big Cleaning on the anniversary of the Big Flood!


The grounds need a good cleaning – gardens need to be weeded, edged and mulched. Since we will be outside, physically distancing will be much easier. We can begin at 10:00 a.m. and work until we're finished – or work until you're finished! If you need gardening tools, we will have those available. What we do need, however, is about 5 – 6 wheelbarrows and shovels. If you have those, please bring them.

Most of our current gardening crew is on the far side of 40 (far side of 50?, far side of 60?). We need help – it's becoming more and more difficult to shovel mulch into wheelbarrows and take it to various gardening beds to spread. We need some "younger" folk to help us. Please consider volunteering.

I know you're more interested in the building. When can we worship in the sanctuary again? Here's where we are: the installation of the new elevator is almost complete, the bathrooms have been returned to pre-COVID condition, the painting is complete with the exception of the staircase and narthex, the kitchen cabinets have been ordered, and shelving installed. The flooring is scheduled to be installed beginning April 7<sup>th</sup> and will take 3-4 days to complete. We will be retrieving our possessions from storage in time for our big cleaning day of April 17<sup>th</sup>.

Once we have retrieved our possessions, we will need volunteers to help sort, clean and put items away. It would be most helpful if different groups sorted different things; i.e. a group to sort documents, a group to sort nursery items, a group for kitchen, a group for middle school, a group for Godly Play, a group for high school, a group for music, and a group for everything left over – or form your own group. After the sorting has been completed, we can put together a list of items that need to be purchased.

Pick a project for April 17<sup>th</sup>. Work in the gardens or work inside helping to sort. There is something for everyone young and old to do. Since this will be an all-day affair, water, snacks and lunch will be provided.



By the grace of God and with the help of a lot of people, we should have the majority of our work complete by the time Bishop Budde joins us.

# MUSIC

## What Do We Need with A Deacon?

I have come on board at Redeemer at a time of disjointedness in the community due to the pandemic and so have met so very few of you and I wish that was not the case. I am looking forward anxiously to being together and getting to know you all. I thought perhaps I could talk a little about the Diaconate and the role of the Deacon in the church and parish

The diaconate was first envisioned by the apostles as a help for the social needs of the growing community of believers and the realization they could not be pastorally present to everyone and still maintain their primary role of teaching and preaching. The first deacons were appointed to look after the welfare of the more marginalized in the community (especially widows and orphans). The role evolved in many directions over the first few centuries of the church and the deacons became the special assistants to the bishops also in administrative roles and other duties as the need arose. It was not unusual for a deacon to become a bishop without the intervening role of presbyter (or priest). As the number of presbyters increased the role of deacon declined but has been vigorously revived in the last century. Deacons are assigned by the bishop to a parish community to assist the rector and the community both especially as regards issues of social justice and peace. However, that is not all deacons are trained to do. Deacons assist at the eucharist, proclaiming the gospel and sometimes preaching. Deacons teach and are active in the spiritual formation of communities. Deacons may also provide pastoral care in the case of those who are sick, homebound or otherwise unable to be with the community, though not as confessors. Deacons are active in the world as those who speak and advocate for the underserved and marginalized and mobilize congregations to join them in service.



The mission of the deacon in the church is: "I am among you as one who serves". This means that the deacon is to be available to parishioners in need and to the community as a whole as a representation of our shared call to be servants to one another and servants of God. In coming to Redeemer, it is my sincere hope to be active in fostering a healthy and active community of believers who are committed in love to one another and to the wider community. I hope that you will come to see me as one who is available to you and that you will call on me to be of service not only pastorally but organizationally as well. We can only answer God's call to serve the needs of the world when we are first the servants of one another in love. When we live into this reality, we are truly empowered to carry that love and healing into the greater world with authenticity.

Please introduce yourself to me and let me know how I can be among you as one who serves!

### Treasurer's report for April Redeemer Spirit 03-30-2021

Church of the Redeemer's 2021 financial operating results through February are set forth in the adjoining profit and loss statement. The profit and loss statement records normal operating income and expenses and generally does not include flood and significant facility upgrade costs and related revenues, which are tracked in restricted accounts. A table summarizing these costs and revenues also is set forth below. The fund balances provide a head start on the substantial costs still ahead to complete the flood recovery and facility upgrade that are underway.

### Episcopal Church of the Redeemer March 2021 Vestry Meeting

#### Consent Agenda

Minutes of February meetings was amended, moved, seconded, and passed.

#### Treasurer's Report

Table added to bottom of P&L with tracking of funds accounted for outside the regular budget. They are Flood, Building Reserve, and Insurance proceeds.

Redeemer is financially sound. With all the work being done on the church, it's being spent at a much higher rate. Need to have realistic overview of where all the money is being spent before starting any new projects

Out of pocket cost for the elevator will be roughly \$120K. Previous estimate was \$100K. Reasons behind increase relate to upgrading utilities to code, construction for machine room, and addition of a sump pump.

There is a slight downtick in incoming pledges. It's still early in the year, but Steve reminded the vestry to keep their pledges current and remind others.

Motion to accept the treasurer's report, seconded, passed.

Follow-up question regarding diocesan budget item: Bishop was encouraging parishes to give 10%, to tithe. We're at 8%. Other thing is that the diocese is much more active now than it was before Bishop Budde in supporting parishes. Diocese does provide advice, human resources to parishes, as well as funding for outreach. So, a worthwhile expenditure in our budget.

Bathroom floors are painted and look great.


