FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Dear Friends,

With Thanksgiving barely in the rearview mirror, somehow it has become December, and with Christmas and the end of the year looming, that fourth gear of planning for celebrations and gifts is hard to resist.

Advent, however, calls for a lower gear—one in which we wait and anticipate. The definition of advent (the word as well as the liturgical season) as "coming into view or place or being" implies that there will be a revelation or a change. But we could miss it if we don't savor the yearning or lose our focus on the journey. Redeemer offers a respite from the harried season with its Sunday worship services, and with Lessons and Carols (Dec. 8th at 5 pm) and an Advent Retreat at Redeemer on Saturday Dec. 14th from 9 am to noon.



At our November vestry meeting we discussed refinancing our mortgage at a better rate. Cricket met with Josh Hildreth (former parishioner) and an architect to discuss the possibilities for seating upstairs. We discussed the fact that for coordination and economies of scale, we should have a grand plan for the building instead of doing things and fixing things a la carte. And a grand plan should start with who we want Church of the Redeemer to be for its members and for the neighborhood. As you proceed through Advent, think about this question.

May you and all you love have peace and joy this season.

FROM THE HEARTH

Happy Advent!

In the last 10 years or so, my understanding of Advent has changed. Once a countdown to the wonderful Feast of the Incarnation we know as Christmas, it's become for me an opportunity to contemplate what the kingdom/reign/government of God might look like. Given the story of the end of the season, it looks like a baby born on the margins of society. But, what does it mean today? In my sermon on the last Sunday after Epiphany, I talked about the example of leadership that Jesus gave us. If Jesus trusted the reign of God to his disciples, then we – as inheritors of that reign – are also called to leadership. The church (that's us!) should be leading our neighborhood into the reign of God.



To do this, we require a shared mission. The catechism states that the mission of the church is to bring all people into unity with God and with each other. That's a lovely statement, but what does it mean? Well, that's what we must discern.

Redeemer is not the church it was 5 years ago. The Episcopal Church was not the church it was 5 years ago either. Once upon a time, strategic plans were made for 5-10 years out. Today, things change so fast that this strategizing needs to happen more often. We're overdue.

As we contemplate this work, we need to remember a few realities:

Church no longer plays the part in society it once played. Today we are more like the early church than we ever have been. This isn't a bad thing. The faithful people of the first centuries of Christianity provide a powerful witness to their time.

People no longer come to church on a weekly basis. Schools, sports, and other activities have taken over Sunday morning. We can either whine about this or face the reality of it and change in response.

Because of number 2, to present a critical mass of people at a service, more folks need to be on our rolls. Five years ago, we had an average Sunday attendance of 150. Today, it's closer to 120. But, if you look at the number of new people here, you'll realize that we've grown on the rolls but not in the pews. If a full church is a goal, we must double the number of people who are members.

Research from the Pew Institute, Mission Insite, and the Episcopal Church shows that churches are most relevant when they address the needs of their immediate neighborhood. The data for the Bannockburn/Cabin John area indicates that we are already supplying some of what is needed, but it may not be as well publicized as it should be.

Bottom line: We must articulate a mission that we all can feel a part of in order to enter the next phase of our lives together. If there was anything learned over the last year of experimenting it's that moving things around may have gotten us to this point, but it's not going to get us to the next place we need to be. It was important to shake things up. Now, it's important to shape things up.

Redeemer has been given everything we need to move into the next decade. Our responsibility is to discern what those gifts are and how God wants us to use them to God's glory and the welfare of God's people. Amma Cricket+

HOLIDAY VOLUNTEERING

Holiday Volunteer Opportunity - Be a NCCF Elf!

The National Center for Children and Families invites you to volunteer for their Santa's Workshop!

The goal of Santa's Workshop is to give our clients the opportunity to give holiday gifts to their children without the financial burden. Our mission of preserving childhood is foremost in our minds and hearts for this venture as we want to empower our parents and guardians to choose gifts that they can give on their own.



Elf Tasks:

SANTA'S WORKSHOP ELF: Greet the client's as they arrive for their scheduled times. Please keep in mind that we are not monitoring the gifts that clients choose, we are there to help. There are no rules to enforce. The program staff will be the ones that monitor and help with quantity.

GIFT WRAPPING ELF: Just as the title says, Gift wrapping the presents the clients choose! They may or may not choose to have gifts wrapped. We will also have gift bags as needed.

TOY STOCKER ELF: All the thousands of toys received by NCCF that are destined for our children must be organized and sorted into age appropriate locations on tables. We also have toys that will have to be moved from various locations around the building and potentially helping donors bring in toys from their cars. Please make sure all gifts are logged (in and out) and donation receipts are given as needed.

GIFT CHECKER ELF: Checkers help pack and prep the gifts for clients and staff. This is an important step in making sure each child in the family has something to open for Christmas. This is the final check before the gifts go out to the children so attention to detail is important. This position can be physical and requires a lot of standing and some lifting (of the Santa bags) so you will want to dress appropriately and wear comfortable shoes.




November's Youth Group

December is always a special month for music and this year is no exception. On the 8th we have our Advent Lessons & Carols by Candlelight service, with a series of favorites and newer works by composers such

as John Rutter and the late Richard Rodnev Bennett. We also remember with sadness that Stephen Cleobury left us on St Cecilia's Day in November, and we shall be singing his arrangement of Let all mortal flesh keep silence from his and Malcolm Archer's essential Advent for Choirs book. And at the same time, for ourselves, we will be looking beyond the three traditional Carols for Choirs books from Oxford University Press (trailblazing as they were!). 


More Jesus More Love Tickets

PLEDGE UPDATE



2020 Pledge Update and 2019 Reminder

THANK YOU to all who have pledged your financial support to Redeemer for next year. Your gifts are much appreciated. As of November 24th, we have received 65 pledges

for \$346,779. This is 75% of our budget goal. We still need to hear from many of you who have pledged in the past. You can send in a pledge card, bring it on Sunday and place it in the offering plate, or complete it online. (Go to https://www.redeemerbethesda.org/stewardship-giving/pledge-card/.)

There are still approximately 25 families yet to pledge. However, if these pledges come in the same as last year, we will be short of our goal. This means if you have not ever submitted a pledge, this is the year to begin! New pledges are truly a necessity. The vestry needs all of your responses for the December 18th meeting.

REMINDER to those of you who pledged for 2019. Please be sure your pledge is current. We need your completed pledges to ensure that we do not end the year with a larger deficit than was budgeted for. Thanks to unplanned for repairs to the church and rectory, we've had more expenses that we'd hoped, even with insurance coverage. Your full pledge payment is important.

ON-LINE PLEDGING AND DONATIONS

Pledge payments: Payments can be made on a pledge (one-time/monthly/weekly) using a checking/savings account or with a credit/debit card. Participants can create a profile, set up recurring payments and make one-time donations. Donors may also choose to cover the service fee if they wish to do so. A receipt for each and every payment will go to the donor and to the Parish Office. For donations of stock, please contact the Parish Office.

For the 2019 Pledge Campaign, you may complete an electronic pledge card, send it to the office, and then continue on to set up payment. Printed pledge cards are available in the Narthex and in the Parish Hall.

Donations: Donations can be made using the on-line service for parish programs, such as Altar Flowers, Friends of Music at Redeemer, Memorials, and other ad hoc donations. These will all be one-time payments.

Payment Information: Payment information is secure. Access is only possible by the donor, Vanco and the Parish Office through specially set up passwords and access codes.

Treasurer's Report

Set forth in the adjoining table are Church of the Redeemer's financial operating results through the end of October. Net operating income for October was \$25,256 below budget for the month, due largely to below budget pledge income, a \$10,000 down payment on rectory repairs, and accumulated choral section leader expense. While it presently appears that the year-end result will be better than the budgeted deficit amount, the actual final result will depend significantly on pledge fulfillment and remaining rectory repair costs during the final two months of the year.
