The Repent and Repair project created by the revitalized Building and Grounds committee is described elsewhere in this newsletter. Your involvement will be a blessing to us all.

I am excited about our new service – *The***FIVE** – that begins on March 1st at (duh) 5:00pm. *The***FIVE** isn't your grandmother's Episcopal church service. It does inhabit the frame of the Eucharistic Service proscribed in the *Book of Common Prayer* (p. 400-401). I hope you will avail yourself of this afternoon offering at least once during Lent. the same format for the Tuesday in Holy Week service. Perhaps that can be your chance to experience this contemplative and multi-sensory worship. The substantive poem *Ash Wednesday*, written by T. We'll have more information about the Vestry Retreat in the weekly newsletters that are distributed on Sunday mornings. If a part of your Lenten discipline is self-examination, know that the sacrament of confession is available by appointment. Don't be surprised if your godly admonition afterward is to **sign up for Repent and Repair items on March 28th!**

MEN'S RETREAT 2020



The Ruins of Lifta, the third and final screening of the Voices From the Holy Land (VFHL) 2020 film series, will be presented **Sunday, March 15 at 2 pm**, Universalist Unitarian Church, Arlington (VA). The series is free to the public. VFHL is a locally based volunteer group whose mission is to raise awareness and understanding of issues through the voices of Palestinians and Israelis,

and especially to give a voice to the voiceless. The Episcopal Church of Redeemer is among 48 faith organizations supporting VFHL.

Synopsis: Lifta is the only Palestinian village abandoned in the 1948 Arab-Israeli war that was not subsequently destroyed completely or repopulated. Its ruins are the backdrop for a confrontation between mega-narratives underlying the conflict: the Nakba and the Holocaust. Co-director Menachem Daum (with Oren Rudavsky)--an Orthodox Jew from Brooklyn whose Holocaust research opened his eyes to a tragedy born from an earlier tragedy—meets Yacoub Odeh, a Palestinian expelled from Lifta. Odeh leads the struggle to save Lifta from Israeli plans to build luxury villas. The two join forces, and a climactic encounter between a Holocaust survivor and a Nakba refugee ensues.

The Truth: Lost at Sea, the second screening of the Voices From the Holy Land (VFHL) 2020 film series, will be presented Sunday, March 1 at 2 pm, Washington National Cathedral (DC). The series is free to the public. VFHL is a locally based volunteer group whose mission is to raise awareness and

understanding of issues through the voices of Palestinians and Israelis, and especially to give a voice to the voiceless. The Episcopal Church of Redeemer is among 48 faith organizations supporting VFHL.

Synopsis: Directed by Rifat Audeh, the film tells the story of the Gaza Freedom Flotilla, a convoy of ships carrying humanitarian aid in an effort to break Israel's blockade of Gaza in 2010. The flotilla's participants are concerned citizens from around the globe who came together on a life-changing voyage to alleviate the suffering of strangers. It shows the Israeli attack upon their flotilla, with both footage that was broadcast and more that was smuggled off the ships, and analyzes the claims of Israeli spokes-persons in the aftermath of the IDF's killing of numerous activists. Those claims are juxtaposed with the survivors' story and their statements before, during and after the attack, and includes never-before-seen footage from aboard the vessels. The Lenten Altar

Certainly you have noticed that during Lent, our altar becomes barren. The sacred vessels are switched to ceramic, which is a humbler and less delicate material than the silver used at other times of year. The altar flowers are replaced with garden detritus that are lifeless and unchanged for the entire season.

Why is this?

Lent commemorates the period immediately after Jesus's baptism, when he was infused with the Holy Spirit. Jesus spent those forty days fasting and praying while resisting the temptations of Satan. The Lenten altar reminds of us our Lord's self-denial and time of prayer as he was forged into the Light of the World. It also focuses our awareness on the death that comes

before life. In the words of Jesus: I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die.



You'll notice that the altar hangings and the priest's chasuble remain vibrant. They are purple, a royal color, to remind us that Christ is King.

We are encouraged to use this season for self-denial, as Jesus denied His own physical wants while God built up his spiritual being. Many of us use this time for contemplation of our relationship with God, repentance of our waywardness, and supplication for the strength to change. The altar provides a visual focus for this period of introspection and prayer. It is through opposites that we see more clearly. And so, at Easter, the glorious transformation of the altar helps us experience the ecstasy of Christ's resurrection. If you have not paid much attention before to the seasonal changes of the altar, Lent is a good time to look more closely.

REPENT AND REPAIR

(A Day of Lenten Service)

Lent is a time of prayer and repentance – turning around and changing direction; a time of preparing for the rejuvenation that is Easter. In this spirit the Buildings and Grounds Committee invites you into Repent and Repair! On March 28th from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. we will have a morning of repairing many of the "little things" that have been left undone and do not require professionals. These include some projects that cost absolutely no money but need physical effort, some projects that may need a small outlay of cash as well as manual labor and some projects that need only your cash – no physical labor involved. Sign up for a project and meet us on March 28th or, if you are unable to participate that date, select a project and complete it on your own time (preferably during Lent). If a project is too big for you to complete on your own then join with another person or family and complete it together.

What can you do?

SORT (basement storage, kids' school supplies, the kitchen, documents)

Take down and clean the light covers (remove the bugs)

Wash windows (one window or a room full of windows - or the whole parish hall)

Clean the refrigerator and/or stove

Add kneelers to the chairs

There are many other projects too. Just ask.

Following Jesus in Anxious Times

Sometimes I buy a book based on the title alone. Sitting in the office of the priest I see for spiritual counsel, this title caught my

eye: Following Jesus: Finding Our Way Home in an Age of Anxiety by the late Henri Nouwen. In an instant I knew that this was to be my reading companion in Lent. If you're still looking for Lenten inspiration, I invite you to join me.

Published in 2019, *Following Jesus* is based on six talks that Nouwen gave for a church in Boston in Lent 1985. It was a particularly unsettled season in his life. Two years earlier, he had returned from a failed missionary effort in Peru that had left him isolated and restless. He then accepted a prestigious teaching position at Harvard Divinity School, but the competitive academic atmosphere only added to his feelings of loneliness and uncertainty.

Thus his topic-how to follow Jesus in an anxious time-wasn't theoretical for Nouwen. Reading his words, you can feel his soul-searching energy.

HEALTH MINISTRY

G is for Germs: Viruses and Church

We all need to plan for a time when we may need to do church differently because of the threat of illness. This isn't about a common cold or seasonal flu. This plan is about the possibility of a pandemic, such as the coronavirus, at our doorstep.

First, don't panic. There is no indication that anyone from Redeemer has been exposed to this virus.

However, we can begin to take precautions. We can switch from shaking hands at the peace to an 'elbow bump' or to bow to each other and wish each other peace. If you do shake hands, please use hand sanitizer afterward.

You're asked to consider not using intinction when you receive communion. Why? Well, here are a few reasons:

- 1. After we pass the peace, especially if you have shaken hands, you are germy.
- 2. Putting the wafer into your hand makes it germy.
- 3. Dipping the wafer into the wine (or grape juice) make the wine/juice germy.

It is more hygienic to receive the wine from the chalice. The chalice bearers are trained to wipe the rim each time and turn the chalice. We use Port as our sacramental wine. It has more alcohol content than regular wine and will do away with many germs. Alas, grape juice does not have this magic quality. So, if you are dipping the wafer into grape juice you are helping the germs multiply. <u>Receiving the bread alone is full communion. It is not required that you receive</u> <u>the wine.</u> If you don't want to drink from the common cup, please just touch the bottom of it when the chalice bearer comes to you. This is an acceptable way to acknowledge and participate in the sacrament.

Health experts agree that common sense preventative practices are the most effective disease control. These include:

- Frequent, effective hand-washing
- Staying home when sick

• Covering your mouth when sneezing or coughing (using a tissue or elbow instead of hands) As we are in close contact during our worship and in community, it is especially important that we practice and promote personal hygiene.

Should we become exposed to this virus, traditions like our high-contact Peace and the use of grape juice will need to be set aside in the interest of health. Thank you for your understanding and pray for a quick end to flu season!

Set forth in the adjoining table are Church of the Redeemer's financial operating results for the month of January. January income includes carry-in of prepaid income items from 2019 designated for 2020 as follows: 2020 pledge (\$147,020), 2020 non-pledge (\$15,000), and 2020 over pledge (\$439). The January budget for pledge income is adjusted to take the prepaid amount into account. Since pledge income is front-loaded by the carry-in, "Over (Under) Budget", rather than "Actual", is the better income benchmark for assessing financial performance.
