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FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Dear Friends,

Thank you to everyone who made our Leap of Faith month a success—especially the organizers, Melinda and Sylvia—plus Geoffrey with back-to back concerts, the cooks Jefferson and Cathy, Karen and the silent auction, the chaperones to the youth lock-in, Cricket!, and the many volunteers who made the month of celebration such a fertile one.

At the vestry meeting we discussed, as always, the budget and how best to be stewards of our resources. We've developed a wish list of projects and investments that ranges from new sturdy shelves in the basement to better lighting on the Shipman steps to a new piano for the sanctuary. We're considering refinancing the mortgage, and we discussed where to park our building and other reserves so that they remain liquid but also make some money for us.



Regarding the pews, we discussed at our meeting the proposal of the church layout consultant—which included hiring an architect, convening a building committee, and other actions that seem to go beyond the scope of what we had in mind. Cricket has contacted him to discuss and adjust and to send in another proposal. Cricket also contacted former parishioner Josh Hildreth (an interior designer) to get his ideas on the pews arrangement. He plans to come to Redeemer with an architect colleague for a consult.

November is Stewardship Month! Please bring in your pledges that first Sunday.

We are blessed to be part of this parish family with the many opportunities it offers us for spiritual engagement, growth, and fellowship.

FROM THE HEARTH

David Hoogerheide shared with us a wonderful insight into the Christian life on Sunday: Christianity and Church are rife with paradox. David wrote:

In the contemporary firehose stream of misinformation, disinformation, and hyperinformation, (church) tethers us through music and aesthetics and sacrament. It is a sanctuary but redeems through engagement and not avoidance. We practice peaceful striving and active resting. Here, winning is loss and losing is gain.



For Christians, God is paradox. God is spirit come to earth and made flesh. God is gender neutral and gender specific. God is majestic and ordinary. To become a member of a Christian community, one must "die" with Christ baptism in order to live with Christ. Even if you come in last, you are first. We may think we are perched on higher or lower rungs of the ladder of life, but God sees a level plain. We are all equally loved, valued, and worthy of respect and dignity.

On November 3rd, All Saints' Sunday, we offer to God our financial commitment through our pledge to Redeemer. Every pledge is a blessing. The paradox of pledging is that once you begin giving as a way of saying thank you for all you've been given, the practice grows and goes beyond money. People who give of their time and talent and treasure regularly report that they receive more than they give. I know that's been true for me.

When you make giving a priority you stay committed and connected to the community to which you give. Of course, we need to pay the staff, keep up the maintenance, and pay the utilities. What will carry Redeemer into its next generation, however, is giving tethered to a deep commitment to Christ and his redeeming love. That is the message of hope and healing we carry into the world. That message invites others to join us.

Dear Redeemer Faithful,

Today the Vestry has published notice that the next Annual Meeting of the Parish will be held on January 12, 2020. At that meeting, you will be asked to vote on a new, comprehensive set of Parish bylaws that will replace the existing ones. There are two principal reasons for adopting new bylaws.

First, every parish in our diocese is required to have bylaws that conform to the diocesan canons. Redeemer's bylaws have not been updated in over two decades and are out of compliance with the current canons. The new bylaws conform to the canons of our diocese and the Episcopal Church. They include some optional provisions permitted by the canons, such as conducting vestry meetings, or voting, by means of electronic communication.

Second, changing what constitutes a quorum of voting Parish members at annual and special meetings will ensure that parish business can be accomplished. The Vestry recommends that the quorum be reduced from 30 percent to 20 percent of the voting members of the Parish. This is not out of line with current practice in the diocese. Some parishes go as low as 10 percent—St. Columba's, for instance.

The concern about having a quorum to adopt the new bylaws has precipitated the unusual 10:30 worship service on January 12th. We expect that the greatest number of Parish members will be present during the service. If past experience is any guide, significantly fewer will attend the Annual Meeting after the service. With that in mind, we will hold the voting-on-the-bylaws part of the Annual Meeting during the service. My annual address to the Parish will be given in lieu of the sermon, and the vote on the new bylaws will be taken by voice just before we adjourn. Following the vote, the Annual Meeting will move downstairs. We will continue with the rest of the meeting once everyone has had some coffee and a snack.

If the new bylaws are adopted, the 20% quorum requirement will be in effect, making it more likely that we would be able to go forward with the election of new vestry members and laydelegates to the diocesan convention. I recognize that this will be a tad disruptive to the worship experience, but it comes at the end. The Vestry and I believe that the needs of the Parish justify this one-time inconvenience.

The notice of the January Annual Meeting appears in the November *Redeemer Spirit* published today. You will find on the Parish website the proposed bylaws with explanations of the changes being made to the existing bylaws.

You will find the proposed new bylaws on the <u>Parish website</u>. Note that any section of the bylaws that is changing is followed by an explanation of the changes. Each explanation contains citations to the relevant canons of the diocese and the Episcopal Church. You will see that most of the changes are being made to conform the bylaws to the canons. The canons are available on the websites of the diocese and the Episcopal Church. Paper copies of the proposed Redeemer bylaws, and the explanation of changes, are posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall together with a copy of the existing bylaws; links to electronic copies will also be included in the weekly Parish email and in the Sunday service bulletins.

The Vestry will arrange for opportunities for parishioners to ask questions and make comments regarding the proposed bylaws. Please let me or Susan Fitzgerald know if you are interested in such a meeting.

It is important that as many parishioners as possible attend both the January 12 worship service and the resumed Annual Meeting in the Parish Hall following that service. Thank you for your cooperation

Following on from a busy start to the season, this month we have two major musical undertakings, a co-production with my District Chorale ensemble, and the Glen Echo Ensemble in Rutter's Requiem

for All Souls' Day on Saturday November 2. This is an interesting and beautiful Requiem, a very personal composition by British composer, John Rutter. In his words, "...unlike most of my work up to that point, it was not commissioned: a personal bereavement was the immediate reason for writing it. Its precedents were the small-scale, intimate Requiems of Fauré and Duruflé rather than the great dramatic frescoes of Berlioz and Verdi; and, as with many Requiems since about 1850, the music is not a complete setting of the Missa pro defunctis as laid down in Catholic liturgy but instead a meditation on themes of life and death using a personal compilation of texts. Like Fauré, I selected portions of the Requiem Mass, and like Britten I wove other, English texts into them to form a counterpoint to the Latin. The English texts consist of two psalms used at funerals (Psalms 130 and 23) together with some of the Burial Sentences from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer...The seven-movement structure is arch-like. The first and last movements are prayers to God the Father (with texts according to the Missa pro defunctis); movements 2 and 6 are psalm settings, both with instrumental obbligatos; movements 3 and 5 are personal prayers to Christ; and the central Sanctus, the keystone of the arch, is celebratory and affirmative, using bells as is traditional at this point in a mass. Gregorian chant (a thread running through much of my work) is found at a number of points in Requiem, most overtly in the Agnus Dei, where fragments of the Easter Sequence, Victimae paschali laudes, are played on the flute before and during the words, 'I am the resurrection and the life.' In the final Lux aeterna, the opening few notes of the theme first sung by the sopranos are taken from the chant associated with that text." It is a beautiful

piece, and our performance offering will be supported by a team of first-class players in the Glen Echo Ensemble:

Advent Quiet Day 2019 at Redeemer

God within the Body: Paradox & Incarnation

December 7, 2019, 9:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m., St. Luke's Chapel space

This gathering will be a quiet morning of silence and reflection centered on Benedictine spirituality as explored by spiritual teacher Esther de Waal in *Living with Contradiction* (Morehouse, Harrisburg PA1987; reissued with new preface 1997/1998).

In her new preface to this meditation on the Psalms and the spirit of St. Benedict and his Rule, Esther de Waal shares one of her insights:

It is curiously liberating to realize that I shall go on until the day of my death trying to hold differing things together and that the task (for which I need all the help that I can get) must be to do it creatively, so that the tensions may become life-giving.

She goes on to explore connections that may be described as connections between healing and discernment, self -acceptance and the ability to go on and to go out into the world to help it heal, too. She provides questions for reflection that we will use after each chapter.

Treasurer's Report

Set forth in the adjoining table are Church of the Redeemer's financial operating results through the end of September. Net operating income for September was \$34,144 below budget for the month, driven mainly by below-budget pledge income and final payment on the church roof repair.

As a result, the surplus of net operating income over budget year-to-date has been reduced to \$2,600. Since the annual budget anticipates a \$28,047 deficit, the erosion of the surplus over budget indicates that Redeemer is likely to end the year close to the budgeted deficit, subject to unanticipated positive or negative developments.
